Perris Talent Shines at Tree Lighting Ceremony

The City of Perris officially welcomed in the holiday season Nov. 28 when Mayor Daryl Busch and other elected officials threw the ceremonial switch to light the towering Christmas tree at the City Hall Campus.

Members of the City Council took to the stage and led the audience in counting down the seconds until the tree lights burst into color.

A crowd of hundreds cheered the 28th annual tree lighting but that was only the beginning of an evening of festivities and entertainment. Santa Claus arrived atop a City of Perris fire engine, the audience was treated to holiday snacks and the kids got an up-close look at goats and llamas in a petting zoo.

"This is a great event, one that has always been successful and one that we look forward to every year," Busch said. "We appreciate the schools and our local churches for supporting this effort. It's always a thrill to turn on the lights and join in on the celebration."

Madison performed "Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree" and "Silent Night." Madison said she has taken part in beauty pageants, modeling contests and singing competitions.

"I'm excited," she said. "This is where I grew up. I want to rock the stage. I love the City of Perris and I am thankful they've provided me with the opportunity to sing."

For the Tree Lighting Program, they performed a "Hula auana" (a contemporary hula) and a Tahitian "Christmas Otea" (Tahitian group dance.)

Martin said the Polynesian Club was founded a decade ago and practices Hawaiian, Tahitian, Samoan and Maori (New Zealand) dances.

"The kids are great," Martin said. "They show great passion for their work. We love to perform and we love being invited to take part in City of Perris events."
