

## Perris Honors the 2013 Students of the Year

The five graduating high-school seniors honored May 21 by the Perris Valley Chamber of Commerce share some common traits: hard work, inquisitiveness, selflessness, service to community, a desire to make a difference.

Those qualities were evident when the five took home student of the year honors from the Perris Union High School District, accolades that earned them more than \$1,700-in scholarships, medals, certificates and plaques from local, regional, state and national officials and the praise of elected office-holders.

"You represent the very best of the best," said Perris Mayor Pro-Tem Mark Yarbrough. "With you, anything is possible. The sky is the limit." Yarbrough was one of several business owners who presented the winners with individualized awards—I his case, engraved pens. Other awards included glass mugs, gift cards and a laundry basket as a reminder of all the clothes they will have to wash at college.



Ashley Acosta, 18, from the California Military Institute. Ashley became the first Cadet Command Major in the state of California for her outstanding work as a student leader. She plans to attend California State University, San Marcos, in the fall and will be studying to become a registered nurse and nurse anesthetist. She credits her time at CMI with helping develop self-confidence and assertiveness.

"I've always strived to improve myself," Ashley said. "I will always think of CMI as my family, my classmates and my peers. I also want to thank the City of Perris for its support in allowing people like me to pursue their passion and careers."

Alejandro Contreras, 18, of Perris High School. A track (1,600-meters) and cross-country (three miles) competitor, Alejandro will be enrolling at UCLA in the fall to major in mathematics and minor in physics or economics. He credits his coach, Troy Stenlake, with serving as a role model and helping him learn the value of motivation, determination and hard-work. Alejandro said he will remember his time as a Perris Panther with fondness because he could concentrate on his academics and athletics without the responsibilities of juggling finances and earning a living.

"I enjoyed the atmosphere and being with my friends," he said.
