Fun for Young and Old at Perris' Halloween Festival

Don't tell the parents and grandparents who came to the annual Perris Halloween festival that the event is all about the pre-teen set. The adults who chaperoned their children and neighbor's kids to the Cesar E. Chavez Library for the 2011 version said there was plenty for them to enjoy.

More than 1,000 people took part in the Oct. 28 celebration, which featured candy giveaways, games, costume contests, puppet shows and the appearance of the Perris Mounted Patrol, who drew big crowds of kids and adults enthralled by their horses. Friends of the Library sold paperback books at 25-cents apiece to help raise funds for their cause.

Parents like Lisa Williams said Perris should give itself a pat on the back for organizing such a well-run, popular and inviting festival. She came with her children, Savannah, 10; Tyler, 6, and Christian, 3.

Perris City employees set up an information booth, sold game tickets and helped keep the festivities running smoothly. The Perris Citizens Patrol also came out to support the Halloween fest.
