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Annual Boat Parade Lights Up Lake Perris

More than 30 canoes, kayaks, jetskis, sailboats and power craft took to the waters of Lake Perris Saturday, decked out in lights, ornaments, trees and wreaths to take part in the annual Lake Perris Holiday Boat Parade.

The City of Perris teamed up with the Perris Police Department to adorn the law enforcement evidence-collection vessel for the parade. Perris City Councilman Mark Yarbrough gave a special shout-out to Perris Police Chief James McElvain for making the trip to the lake possible.

Yarbrough and volunteers from the Perris Citizens Patrol decorated the boat before taking it onto the water, with Officer Dayle Long piloting the craft.



Yarbrough was joined by Michael McAleavey, his wife, Pat, both long-time members of the Citizens Patrol. Also joining the Perris contingent were Jami and Corey Allison and their children, Spencer, 10, and Hailey, 3. All worked Saturday afternoon to decorate the boat with red, white and green lights, garland, stockings and Christmas wreaths.

"This is something different to do," said Michael McAleavey.
"You can drive around your neighborhood and see
Christmas lights but this is a little more unique. The City of
Perris sponsors a lot of good things and I am glad they are
involved in this effort as well."

All the boats circled around a cove at the lake, giving spectators a good chance to give them a good inspection.





Some entries came with just a string of lights; others were decked out big-time, with lights, reindeer, cartoon characters, candy canes, trees and stars.

Prizes were awarded to the best entries.

Kyle Miller, of Riverside, constructed a design that resembled Santa Claus launching his reindeer from a rooftop.
