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Joanne Evans Wins City Council Seat

A month after the polls closed, retired firefighter and former Marine Joanne Evans was declared the victor in the election for an open seat on the Perris City Council.

Evans bested Christopher Sandoval by 12 votes in the Nov. 4 Perris municipal election.

The final results, certified Tuesday by the Riverside County Registrar of Voters, indicated Evans won 3,603 votes to Sandoval's 3,591.

City Clerk Judy Haughney said Evans will be sworn in Monday during a special City Council ceremony. She replaces John Motte, who chose not to seek another term on the Council.

"My gosh, I'm glad this has ended," Evans said from her home Tuesday. "This has been such a close race. I was afraid to look at the final results. I am happy it is finally over."

Evans is a 40-year Perris resident deeply involved in the community. She retired after 35 years with Cal

She and her husband, Iral, volunteer at the annual Veterans' Day Parade and Christmas Parade. Joanne Evans served four years active duty with the Marines Corps and another three years in the Marine Reserves. She has served as commander of American Legion Post 595 in Perris and has received numerous awards on behalf of her work for veterans. She has been honored by the American Legion and the Riverside County Board of Supervisors for service to members of the military. Iral Evans is a Navy veteran.





Fire in 2004, many spent as the public information officer assigned to the Perris Station just down the street from her residence.

Her son, Clinton Lee II, spent 20 years in the Navy and is an Iraq war veteran. Grandson Roger Fjermestad served in Iraq with the Army and was decorated with the Purple Heart for combat wounds.

In 1998, Evans was named Perris Citizen of the Year by the Christian Women in Ministry. Six years later, she was named Citizen of the Year by Mayor Daryl Busch. She also received an award for Legionnaire of

Evans said she knows she's taking office at a difficult time for the City, which is affected like all California towns grappling with a struggling economy. But she remains confident the Council can steer Perris a course to better days.

"It will be a challenge," she said. "But I believe I will be doing something really good for the City."
