MEMORIES OF PERRIS

Among my earliest memories were trips to Perris for shopping and other business. When my father, William Henry Brown went it was usually in the spring wagon with a large umbrella for shade in the summer, or a lap robe for sleeping warm in the winter. When my mother, Anna Kittilace Brown did the driving she used the surrey with the fringe on top. Pig whose name was really Peg was the driving mare. Her large appetite was responsible for the name change.

After shopping before starting home we entered the house or business at a livery barn. In back of Beck's store, the tall rectangular one on the west side of Main Street, was a silver salver cup to obtain water for the children. On a hot day on the way home it was refreshing to pass by the adobe fields to the Newport Ranch.

The shopping trips quite often included lunch at the Chinese restaurant. One Chinese liked to tease me by pretending to take away my bag of candy, a large amount that I had bought for five cents.

There was a bakery on the east side of Fourth Street. A pleasant and pretty woman there also sold taffy, pink or white. By grandmother, Anna Kittilace bought no pink kind. Her brother, Frank Merrill quite often treated me to ice cream in the drug store at the corner of Fourth and "D" Streets.

A large Great Dane dog was the object of my admiration. Many times he allowed me to pet him when he sat on the sidewalk. Does anyone remember who had a Great Dane in 1915 or so? Garter's greyhounds slept in the street. Traffic drove around them to not distract their rest. The streets were dirt for a long time.

When I was a little girl members of the Hora family came to clean the horse barn on our ranch. They used an open truck, no top, no doors. I watched to see when they were ready to leave then I stood on the porch. They always removed their saddlebikes with a flourish then bowed graciously to me. I thought they were handsome and dashing.

I remember Mr. Lander always as well groomed and quite spiffy. While we shopped for groceries in Kirkpatrick's store I sat in the car with my grandmother. Mr. Lander stopped to chat with Gramma.

We always felt close to the Congregational Church although we attended irregularly. We had Sunday school in the Amatolite school over the years. For some time Rev. Beck and Mrs. Beck came to detective to conduct evening services. Among the interesting exhibits in the lobby there at the old church on Seventh Street was the Wood's Sutton collection. The ice cream socials outside under the trees seemed special. We always enjoyed the Christmas program. Some time live animals were used. At Easter everyone dressed up with hats and gloves no jeans nor jogging suitlike.

Mrs. Readley taught piano. My mother and I attended afternoon recitals in the Readley home. My sister, Ruth was one of the performers. Yet a while there was evening community singing in Perris, a friendly get-together.

The train coming into town was quite an event with the clanging of the bell and the puffing of the steam engine. My parents on occasion left their home and ride in the big stable than seat by train to Riverside. One time my mom was stopped at the station and was screaming mostly a farmer could not persuade his country horse to go close enough to the dock so that his shipment could be loaded onto his wagon. My dad offered to get the goods for him. He drove his city breed horses close to the dock. The shipment was loaded onto his wagon then away from the steaming engine was transferred onto the other farmer's wagon. My dad had brought his horses from Los Angeles. They were accustomed to noise. One day as my mother and I were leaving Perris going south then around the curve in an easterly direction a train was leaving at the same time. At that time the street was on the north side of the track, with the crossing at Perris Boulevard. Pig decided to race the train. It was exciting for a few minutes. He was able to stop Pig before we reached the crossing.

Another exciting event was the Alfalfa Days parades with many horse drawn wagons, buggies, decorated floats and horse back riders. The streets were lined with spectators, people and dogs.

Mr. Stewart, the baker always asked me how I was doing in school. Mr. Herford the realtor also talked with me. Many others took the time to be pleasant to a little girl. Lauer or Mr. Sandrich, the newspaper publisher was most pleasant and helpful when I needed tickets or papers printed. I wrote Memphis news for the Perris Progress.

I remember the really nice fabrics that Beck's store carried. One of my favorite dresses came from there. It was a blue and green plaid cotton crepe. My mother made it.

If this history seems personal it is because I can write only about the things that I have experienced. I remember that people were friendly, going to Perris to shop was also a time to visit.



PROGRESSIVE PERRIS, THE HOME OF ALFALFA

Initial Celebration of Alfalfa Day Was
a Phenomenal Success.

SEVERAL THOUSAND IN ATTENDANCE

Decorations Give City Gala Appearance—
Street Parade-Free Barbecue—
Band Concert-Ball Game—
Minstrel Show.

Early Saturday morning the oil well, green alfalfa farms began to arrive by automobile and horse vehicles from the country. There came from the desert and long distance over the entire country, until 4,000 to 5,000 people were present. The weather was delightfully cool. Many came from Val Verde and Alessandro, on the north, from Lathrop, Ethelton, Winchester and Bakersfield. There were many visitors from Bakersfield and San Joaquin, Bakersfield, and all were represented by many of its prominent citizens. On the morning train visitors arrived from Riverside, Colton and San Bernardino. A few minutes after the regular train the special train pulled in from San Bernardino, Colton and Riverside with the Colton brass band, specially engaged for Alfalfa Day.

The street decorations, which began on Friday, were dedicated Saturday forenoon.

The Big Parade on Alfalfa Day

Soon after the arrival of the visitors the city officials turned out, led by four mounted horses, with two poniards and two bay riders, followed by the Colton brass band and a procession of automobiles and floats, notably decorated for Alfalfa Day. The city trustees left, followed by an unusually enthusiastic President, ex-mayor and former committee chairman of commerce, J. C. McLean, and arranged an alfalfa float on his automobile. It was much admired. Woodward Brothers put a load of green alfalfa on the parade and the driver and children on top of load, carrying hay forks, decorated with green alfalfa, decorated with green alfalfa, and some flowers. The alfalfa float was the second cutting in a field seen to alfalfa April 1, or less than four months previous.

The big alfalfa growers, Wm. Newark, had seven-four miles and eight square rods each of field alfalfa in the parade. After the parade the cars were loaded on the Santa Fe train.

The Val Verde stock company, having 490 acres of alfalfa, Robert Walker manager, made a well-arranged exhibit, described in another column.

Lake Irrigated Farms was powerfully represented in the parade.

A horse and cart decorated with alfalfa and driven by a boy, also a girl on horseback were ap-

peared in the parade. A man appeared with a sign on his back, "City of Perris."

Rich Hiles with wife and child and pipe in his mouth, created much amusement.

J. O. Hardy rode in an auto with wife, Minnie.

Jasper Culver and wife rode in his car, driving his fine team. The enterprising firm of A. C. Hall and Son joined the parade with three wagons fitted up for Alfalfa Day. It was one of the admitted floats of the parade.




John J. Wall, of Los Angeles, representing Emil Firth said, in part:

unity of at least 500 inhabitants, which is located within one county, may incorporate as a city. The of incorporation requires:

- 1) A petition by the landowners of the area;
- 2) A hearing by the County Board of Supervisors; and
- 3) An election by the resident registered voters of the area.

Description of incorporation procedure which follows is as an outline, and not as a definitive which has been approved officially. It is applicable specifically to the County of Los Angeles. Persons intending to oppose an incorporation are urged to consult the California statutes, as well as to engage private legal counsel; for the material of this outline is no substitute.

Principal Steps in Incorporation

Incorporation procedure, from the time it is begun by its proponents to the time the new city comes into being, may require from 5 to 10 months. The time requirements given below represent approximations based on experience given specific statutory requirements of notice. The timetable does not include the time which will be required to circulate a petition among the landowners of the area.
