

2017 Harvest Festival



Perris Mayor Michael Vargas captures a selfie with vendors at the annual Harvest Festival Oct. 20 at the City Hall Campus.


Perris residents used lots of words to describe the City's annual Harvest Festival that took place Oct. 20.

The 2017 Harvest Festival moved to a new venue at Perris City Hall, the result of road construction at the old location at the Cesar Chavez Public Library. The new spot provided plenty of space for ghouls, goblins, ghosts, monsters, creepy clowns, superheroes and cartoon characters. Members of the City's Youth Advisory Committee and the antibullying group Love for Life also were in attendance, as were the Boys and Girls Club of Perris, the Perris Police Explorers, Citizens on Patrol and the sheriff's Mounted Posse.

The night included costume contests, dance ensembles and a puppet show. More than 1,000 people attended the
