YAC Members Sworn into Office

Members of the City's Youth Advisory Committee took to heart the message they received from municipal officials when the volunteer group was formed three years ago.

Elect your own officers, the teens were told. Work with Perris staff to create and implement programs aimed at getting middle and high-school kids involved in helping their City become a better place. Challenge yourself, bring about change, make a positive contribution while having fun.

The Perris City Council on August 30 approved the appointment of new officers and members for the upcoming year. City Clerk Nancy Salazar administered the oath of office.

Mayor Daryl Busch, in remarks to the audience in council chambers and residents watching on television, praised the spirit, maturity and results of the Youth Advisory Committee.

"They meet on a regular basis," Busch said. "They govern themselves, they run their own meeting and they select their own officers. Their involvement with the YAC gives them an insight into how government works."

Since inception, Youth Advisory Committee volunteers have donated hundreds of hours supporting community events.

Those include:

- Assisting at the Live Well Perris Health Fair, Senior Prom Dance, installing solar panels at a City residence and volunteering at the Ice Cream Social and Tree Lighting Ceremony and community clean-up projects.
- Conducting a series of seminars on topics relevant to teenagers such as how to avoid abusive relationships and the importance of not texting while driving.
- Creating new programs like the monthly open mic night which gives aspiring singers, musicians and poets the chance to show their stuff before an audience of their peers.
- Participating in this year's "Job Shadow Day," which provided a behind-the-scenes look at how public and private business employees go about their daily duties.
- Submitting a "Photovoice" project that captured through pictures their concerns about the community. The images captured crosswalks in need of restriping, sidewalks with broken concrete, fast-food restaurants dominating prime locations on major streets and parks with insufficient trash receptacles. The project won the 2016 Public Outreach Award from the Inland Empire Section of the American Planning Association.

"Their hard work and dedication to the Perris community has made the YAC into a successful civic engagement program which has empowered them to inspire positive growth, sustainable change and created value in volunteerism.
