Perris Valley Chamber of Commerce Installation



Perris City Clerk Nancy Salazar, City Councilman David Rabb, City Councilwoman Rita Rogers, Mayor Pro-Tem Tonya Burke and City Councilman Julio Rodriguez attended the annual Chamber of Commerce Business Awards and Installation Dinner on Jan. 30.

Perris Valley Chamber of Commerce members used the organization's annual awards ceremony to restate their commitment to bring new businesses to the City while advocating for those already in Perris.

President Ali Mazarei said the chamber has stepped up its efforts by hosting regular business seminars and a "business boot camp" and will be increasing its social media outreach. Chamber members are attending City Council meetings as well, informing the elected body of ongoing projects and developments. Liaisons are being developed with state and national organizations to lobby on behalf of local businesses in Sacramento and Washington.

Mazarei also unveiled the chamber's "Win Some Wheels" fundraiser, which aims to collect \$200,000 through the sale of \$2 raffle tickets for a pair of Chevrolet Sparks and other prizes. Ticket-sale revenues also would go to support Perris schools and non-profits.

Mazerei said he would like to send some of the proceeds to the Riverside Sheriff's Association to help obtain another canine unit.

The chamber's 104th Annual Business Awards & Installation Dinner drew a number of heavyweight guests. Those included Riverside County Sheriff Stan Sniff, District Attorney Michael Hestrin, Riverside County Supervisor Marion Ashley, Mayor Daryl Busch, Mayor Pro-Tem Tonya Burke and City Councilmembers Rita Rogers, Julio Rodriguez and David Rabb.

A new group of chamber officers was sworn in during the Jan. 30 dinner at Harrison Hall. Mayor Busch thanked the new board members for "their time, efforts, commitment and their endeavors they have put forth into the community."

"The Chamber of Commerce is growing," Busch said. "The Chamber of Commerce helps businesses find out about and get information about our City. These are exciting times as the City of Perris expands and grows. My best wishes go to the Perris Valley Chamber of Commerce for a very successful 2015."

Mayor Pro-Tem Burke said she is looking forward to working with the new chamber board.

"When you have a thriving chamber of commerce, you have a thriving business community," she said. "That's why it is important for us as a City Council to support our chamber of commerce."
